## **Newly arrived families**

Starting a new life in a country with different customs and a different language is daunting for anyone. It's even more complex for newly arrived migrant and refugee families who are often still processing the experiences that caused them to leave their home countries in the first place. In Inner Melbourne, the It Takes a Village programs support children, young people and families from newly arrived or refugee backgrounds and helps them settle into their new community, through playgroups, a reading club, an adventure playground and support to connect with other services.

## Young children

The early years of a child's life are so important for their development, so in Nowa Nowa and many other locations across the state we run kindergartens and playgroups to give young children the opportunity to grow and develop through safe and supported play. Our playgroups also provide parents with support, by connecting them with other services and building their strengths and confidence.







Our programs also support parents and communities, to help them create the best environment for their kids to grow up in. In East Gippsland, we run Volunteer Family Connect, a home-visiting program for parents with small children. Volunteers listen, provide moral support and offer friendship when families need an extra pair of helping hands. Our supported playgroups and early learning programs also help connect parents to other service providers if and when they

Across Victoria, our Hands On Learning programs give kids practical lessons run by artisan teachers, while our Mobile Youth Van uses music, digital media and sport to reach kids who live in remote communities.
