Newly arrived families

Starting a new life in a country with different customs and a new language is daunting for anyone. It's even more complex for newly arrived migrant and refugee families who are often still processing the experiences that caused them to leave their home countries in the first place. Our 'It Takes a Village' program supports children, young people and families who are new to Tasmania and helps them settle into their new community through playgroups, parent clubs and support to connect with other services.

Young children

We understand the importance of reaching the children who need a little extra support as early as possible. The years before school are crucial to healthy development. These are the years when young kids can develop the confidence for a successful start at school – and from there anything is possible! That's why we're working across the state to encourage early learning in the home and to give parents new ideas about how to build confidence and a passion for learning.

Mums, dads and carers

Our programs also support parents and communities, to help them create the best environment for their kids to grow up in. In the heart of Hobart, we run Volunteer Family Connect, a home-visiting program for parents with small children. Volunteers listen, provide moral support and offer friendship when families need an extra pair of helping hands. Many of our other programs also offer support and advice to parents.

Disengaged youth

For young people who have been led astray or have made mistakes that have got them in trouble with the law, it can be hugely challenging to re-engage with their community and to find a path to a positive future. It's critical they have encouragement and open-minded support to help them get back on track. Our work with young people who have been in detention or who are on bail has been enormously successful in helping kids discover new training and employment opportunities and in preventing them from further involvement in the youth justice sustem.
